Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph)

Strengths: Your piece effectively acknowledges the potential benefits of replacing the library with a shopping centre, which demonstrates your ability to consider alternative viewpoints. You've included practical benefits like local shopping convenience and economic advantages.

Weakness: Lack of formal language \rightarrow Your opening uses casual phrasing and inconsistent tone which reduces the persuasiveness in a formal letter to a council. Phrases like "You might have not found enough reasons" and "today im gonna try" don't establish a professional tone needed for civic communication.

Exemplar: Dear Hills Council, While I acknowledge there would be certain benefits to replacing our library with a shopping centre, including improved access to groceries and potential economic growth, I must respectfully present additional compelling evidence for preserving our valuable community library.

#2 (Second paragraph)

Strengths: You've included a specific statistic (42% increase in academic performance) which strengthens your argument. You also appeal effectively to emotion by asking the council to visualise students' happiness.

Weakness: Underdeveloped evidence \rightarrow The statistic presented lacks citation and context. Phrases like "Well multiple studies have shown" and "academic weapon" need more precise language and explanation of which studies and when they were conducted.

Exemplar: According to research published by the National Education Association in 2023, students who regularly utilise library facilities for studying demonstrate a 42% improvement in academic performance compared to those without access to such resources. Our community's young people deserve this proven pathway to educational success.

#3 (Third paragraph)

Strengths: You attempt to use historical evidence about literacy rates in your community, which shows awareness of the need to include specific data. You also include an expert opinion, showing understanding of persuasive techniques.

Weakness: Credibility issues \rightarrow The evidence presented contains implausible elements and inconsistencies. References to "Dr Dre" as "one of the best professors in the world" who "read over 500 books" at your library weakens your argument's credibility, as does the claim that literacy jumped from 70% to 94% in one week.

Exemplar: Twenty years ago, our community participated in a literacy assessment conducted by the Regional Education Authority, which identified a concerning literacy rate of 70%. Following their recommendation to increase library usage, our community embraced this resource, resulting in literacy rates improving to 94% over the following year—a testament to the library's crucial educational role.

■ Your letter shows good instincts for persuasive writing by including statistics and attempting to refute counterarguments. However, your piece would benefit from more precise language, credible evidence, and logical organisation. Try separating your strongest points into distinct paragraphs with clear topic sentences. Also, consider developing your refutation of the shopping centre argument more thoroughly by acknowledging its benefits while explaining why the library still provides greater community value. The historical claims need more realistic timeframes and verifiable references. Your emotional appeals are effective but would be stronger when paired with factual accuracy. Finally, your conclusion could be more specific about what actions you want the council to take beyond just "come to talk to the community."
