Section 1:

Part #1: First paragraph Strengths: Your opening effectively establishes your position as a student affected by the library. You create emotional appeal through phrases like "cherished library" and "priceless artifact." Weakness: Imprecise language and repetition → Your paragraph contains repetitive descriptors like "extremely" used multiple times, and contains imprecise terms such as "prestigious" and "exclusive" without clarifying what makes the library valuable. These vague descriptions reduce the persuasive impact of your argument. Exemplar: "Dear Council, as a student whose academic journey has been significantly enhanced by our library's resources, I implore you to reconsider the planned demolition of this vital community asset. The library serves as both an educational cornerstone and a sanctuary for countless residents."

Part #2: Second paragraph Strengths: You've effectively highlighted the emotional significance of the library as a "second home" and emphasised its multi-faceted role in the community. Weakness: Redundant phrasing → You repeat similar ideas using different phrases such as "heartbreaking and devastating" without adding new information. The paragraph lacks concrete examples of how the library specifically benefits the community. Exemplar: "The library's removal would profoundly impact our community, eliminating not only a quiet space for concentration but also a hub for social connection. Rather than demolition, I believe the Council has the unique opportunity to enhance this beloved institution through thoughtful renovation."

Part #3: Third paragraph Strengths: You've included expert opinion and statistical evidence about literacy decline, which strengthens your argument. You've also addressed a counterargument about the shopping complex. Weakness: Underdeveloped evidence → While you mention Professor Jamal Simmey and statistics from Sabinia, you don't provide sufficient context for these examples or explain how they directly relate to your local situation. The transition between counterargument and your rebuttal lacks clarity. Exemplar: "While proponents argue that a shopping complex would boost employment and generate revenue, they overlook the substantial maintenance costs and the irreplaceable educational value the library provides. Professor Jamal Simmey of Harvard University has demonstrated that 'daily reading, even just one page, is strongly correlated with academic achievement and career success.' This finding is

supported by concerning data from Sabinia, where school performance declined by 39% within three months of their library's demolition."

■ Your piece shows genuine passion and emotional investment in saving the library, which creates a personal connection with readers. However, to strengthen your argument, focus on providing more specific examples of how the library benefits various community members. Also, your evidence needs more development—when citing statistics or expert opinions, explain their significance and relevance to your specific situation. The structure of your letter could be improved by grouping similar points together and creating clearer transitions between paragraphs. Try to vary your sentence structure and avoid repeating emotional appeals without backing them up with concrete details. Adding specific examples of library programmes, resources, or personal stories would make your argument more compelling. Additionally, consider addressing more potential counterarguments to demonstrate that you've thoroughly considered all perspectives.
