Section 1:

#1 (Paragraph 1) Strengths: Your opening paragraph effectively establishes the devastating impact of the wildfires with vivid details about the acres burned and evacuations. You've created a strong emotional connection by mentioning the "staggering" toll on families. Weakness: Lack of international context \rightarrow Your piece fails to address how these bushfires relate to the international community, which was a key requirement in the prompt. There's no mention of global response or how these events might be relevant beyond California's borders. The focus remains entirely domestic despite the prompt asking for coverage of an "event in another country." Exemplar: "California is once again grappling with devastating wildfires, drawing international attention as these increasingly frequent climate disasters reflect similar challenges faced across Australia, Greece, and Portugal, with the United Nations now coordinating a global response to what experts call a worldwide crisis."

#2 (Paragraph 2) Strengths: Your inclusion of personal testimonies from multiple affected residents adds authenticity and emotional depth to the article. The quotes effectively illustrate the human impact of the disaster. Weakness: Inconsistent pronoun usage → You've written "Sabrina Wiener... returned to find her neighborhood decimated" but then continued with "he said" rather than "she said." This creates confusion about the gender of your source and undermines the credibility of your reporting. Attention to detail is crucial in journalistic writing. Exemplar: "Sabrina Wiener, a Northern California resident, returned to find her neighbourhood decimated. 'It feels like walking through a ghost town. Everything we built is gone,' she said."

#3 (Paragraphs 6-7) Strengths: Your conclusion effectively brings hope to a devastating situation by highlighting community resilience and offering concrete ways readers can help, which creates a call to action. Weakness: Incomplete international perspective — While mentioning "outpouring of generosity from across the country," your piece doesn't explore international aid efforts or global policy implications that would make this a truly international news story. The piece reads as though written for a Californian audience rather than an international readership. Exemplar: "The journey to recovery will be long and challenging, but the spirit of California's residents remains unbroken, bolstered by humanitarian aid arriving from Canada, Australia, and the European Union's Civil

Protection Mechanism, which has deployed specialised firefighting aircraft and personnel."

■ Your piece demonstrates strong descriptive writing and emotional appeal through personal stories, but fundamentally misses the mark on the assignment's core requirements. The prompt specifically asked for an article about an event in another country, whereas your piece is written from an American perspective about California. Additionally, you've included promotional elements like a website and contact number that aren't typically found in news articles. Your writing would benefit from reframing the perspective to position the fires as happening in "another country" relative to your supposed audience. Also, you need to expand significantly on international response efforts and global implications of these fires. Try reviewing your piece from the perspective of a British or Australian reader who would view California's fires as happening in "another country." Include specific details about how international organisations like the UN or Red Cross are responding.

Section 2:

California Bushfires
