

Section 1:

#1 Strengths: Your introduction effectively creates a vivid mental image of an untouched paradise with phrases like "emerald peaks transcend the clouds" and "whispers of ancient trees". You've also clearly established the purpose of the writing—to outline rules for a new society.

Weakness: Underdeveloped premise → Your introduction presents an intriguing concept but doesn't fully establish the context for why these specific law categories were chosen. The transition from describing this paradise to announcing "We'll enforce laws" feels abrupt. For instance, when you write "Throughout history, civilisations have risen and fallen in their quest for the ideal society", you could strengthen this by briefly mentioning which specific historical lessons informed your choices.

***Consider expanding with: "From the environmental devastation of the Industrial Revolution to the cultural erasure of colonialism, history offers us clear warnings about what to avoid in our new society."***

#2 Strengths: You've provided a clear explanation of why preserving indigenous cultures is important, and your historical reference to British colonisation in Australia adds relevant context to your argument.

Weakness: Oversimplified historical comparison → Your comparison to British colonisation of Australia, while relevant, is presented in a simplified manner that doesn't capture the full complexity of this historical trauma. When you write "almost wiping out the entire aboriginal population because they rejected the idea of indigenous peoples having rights", you're addressing an important issue but in a way that compresses centuries of complex history into a single sentence. This risks diminishing the ongoing impacts of colonisation that continue today.

***"Like this, we can avoid repeating colonial injustices such as those experienced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in Australia, where cultural practices were banned, languages were lost, and communities were devastated through policies that failed to recognise their sovereignty and rights."***

#3 Strengths: Your section on "Social Harmony and Exploration" effectively balances the human desire to explore with the need to protect resources from exploitation. The concept of designated "safe zones" is an interesting governance approach.

Weakness: Limited elaboration of concepts → This section introduces important ideas but doesn't fully develop them. Your rule "Exploration to discover new things, but not to exploit them" leaves

questions about how exploitation would be defined or prevented. Similarly, "No fighting—safe zone" is vague about what constitutes fighting and how conflicts would be resolved in practice. When you conclude with "so everybody can stay peaceful together", you could strengthen this by outlining some specific mechanisms for maintaining peace.

***"Trained mediators would help resolve disagreements through dialogue rather than conflict, while community councils would determine whether exploration projects serve collective knowledge or merely private gain."***

Additionally, your writing would benefit from more specific details about governance—who would enforce these rules and how? Would decisions be made democratically or through another system? Also, consider addressing potential challenges to your ideal society. What if people disagree about what constitutes "responsible" trading or "unsustainable" practices? Including some acknowledgment of these complexities would strengthen your argument. Finally, your conclusion could be expanded to explain how these three sets of rules would work together as a cohesive system.
