Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph)

Strengths:

- Your emotive language effectively establishes your distress ("heart bleak with sorrow and anguish").
- You clearly state your position against the library demolition.

Weakness: Inconsistent formal tone \rightarrow While your letter begins with appropriate formality, phrases like "unspeakable act" and "act of treachery" seem excessively dramatic for a formal persuasive letter. Additionally, there's inconsistency in your phrasing when you write "considering the devastating act to demolish" and then later shift to "How could you cause waste to the beacon of education." The phrase "I find myself compelled to voice my opposition" is effective, but "indignant among our citizens" doesn't quite convey your intended meaning.

Exemplar: I am writing to express my profound concern regarding the proposed demolition of our community library, a decision which I believe would be met with considerable opposition from local residents.

#2 (Second paragraph)

Strengths:

- Your sensory descriptions create a vivid picture of the library environment.
- You effectively emphasise the educational value of the library.

Weakness: Present tense confusion \rightarrow You begin this paragraph with "By destroying our library, you have shattered the future" which incorrectly suggests the demolition has already occurred, when your letter aims to prevent this. This creates confusion about whether you're protesting a decision already made or one being considered. Your imagery is vivid but the sentence "Imagine the bright light seeping softly through the dark brown timber" shifts focus from the emotional appeal to physical description without connecting back to your argument.

Exemplar: By demolishing our library, you would be eliminating a vital educational resource upon which hundreds of students depend daily for their intellectual development.

#3 (Fourth paragraph)

Strengths:

- Your concluding paragraph effectively frames a choice for the councillor.
- You use a powerful rhetorical question at the end to emphasise your point.

Weakness: Overreliance on emotional appeal \rightarrow Your final paragraph contains powerful sentiments but lacks specific, practical reasons why the library should be preserved. Phrases like "Are we so morally bankrupt" might alienate rather than persuade the councillor. The statement "Will you be remembered as the hero who saved our cherished artifact or the villain" creates a false dichotomy that oversimplifies the issue and might appear manipulative rather than persuasive.

Exemplar: I respectfully urge you to reconsider this proposal and to protect this valuable community resource. Your decision will impact not only current library users but future generations of students who deserve the same educational opportunities we have enjoyed.

■ Your persuasive letter shows your passion for saving the library and includes many required elements such as rhetorical questions and emotive language. However, your piece would benefit from a more balanced approach that combines emotional appeal with logical reasoning. For instance, you might consider mentioning specific benefits the library provides to different community groups or suggesting alternative solutions to whatever problem the demolition aims to solve. Additionally, while your imagery effectively conveys the emotional impact of losing the library, some descriptions become repetitive, particularly in the third paragraph where multiple metaphors describe the same concept of emotional wounds. Also, be careful with your tense usage throughout the letter to maintain clarity about whether you're discussing a potential or actual demolition. Consider revising your conclusion to end with a constructive suggestion rather than confrontational questions, which might be more persuasive to a council representative.
