#1 (Opening paragraph) Strengths: Your introduction effectively states your purpose and establishes a selfless motivation for running. You demonstrate a genuine desire to improve the class environment. Weakness: Lack of compelling hook \rightarrow The opening could be more attention-grabbing to immediately capture your audience's interest. The transition between sentences is somewhat abrupt, missing an opportunity to make a powerful first impression. Exemplar: *Good afternoon, teachers and classmates. #2 (Middle paragraphs on promises) Strengths: You effectively use logos by emphasizing practical, realistic promises. Your commitment to listening before acting demonstrates thoughtful leadership. Weakness: Underdeveloped examples \rightarrow While you mention avoiding "empty promises," you don't provide specific examples of initiatives you would implement. This reduces the persuasiveness of your logical appeal. Exemplar: *If elected as your class president, I will establish a monthly suggestion box system where every student can submit ideas for improvements. I'll then work with our teachers to implement the most pressing and practical solutions, such as organising additional study sessions before exams or creating a peer support network.*

#3 (Emotional appeal closing) Strengths: Your conclusion effectively uses pathos by acknowledging shared struggles and emphasizing community values. The focus on emotional connection creates a memorable ending. Weakness: Limited call to action \rightarrow While emotionally resonant, your conclusion lacks a strong, specific call to action that would motivate students to vote for you. The closing statements could be more emphatic. Exemplar: So when you cast your vote tomorrow, remember that you're not just selecting a president—you're choosing someone who will stand beside you through challenges, celebrate your vote not as a favour, but as an opportunity for us to build something extraordinary together.

■ Your speech demonstrates good instincts regarding the three persuasive appeals, but each element could be strengthened with more specific details. The ethos (authority) portion would benefit from mentioning specific leadership experiences or responsibilities you've held previously. Additionally, your logos section needs concrete examples of problems you've identified and solutions you propose. Your emotional appeal is quite strong but could be enhanced by sharing a brief personal anecdote that illustrates your values in action. Also, consider varying your sentence structure to create more rhythmic and impactful delivery—presidential speeches often use rhetorical techniques like repetition or parallel structure to emphasize key points. Finally, think about weaving in a memorable slogan or phrase that voters can associate with your campaign.
