#1 "It was closed but I could still see inside, and you won't believe what I saw next. It looked like the donuts were acting like the counter was a football field so that means they were alive!"

Strengths: Your opening creates mystery and draws readers in effectively. The comparison of the counter to a football field helps readers visualise the scene.

Weakness: Unclear sentence connections \rightarrow The sentences feel choppy and don't flow smoothly together. When you write "so that means they were alive," it's confusing because seeing donuts on a counter doesn't clearly show they're alive. The connection between your observations needs to be clearer.

Exemplar: "Through the window, I watched in amazement as the donuts moved around the counter like players on a football field."

#2 "Each individual donut had its own personality and name which was shown on a nametag that was shows just above the hole."

Strengths: Adding personalities and names makes the donuts feel like real characters. The detail about nametags is creative and helps readers picture the scene.

Weakness: Grammar confusion \rightarrow You've mixed up your verb forms in "that was shows," which makes the sentence hard to understand. This type of error makes readers stumble whilst reading your story.

Exemplar: "Each donut wore a tiny nametag that showed its name just above the hole."

#3 "The doughnuts couldn't agree on what to do so they decided to vote. The options were: A contest to see who could roll the furthest, a battle so see who can knock the most donuts or a soccer machine using ben as a ball because he was to fat."

Strengths: The voting idea shows good problem-solving and makes the donuts seem more human-like. You've included multiple options which adds detail.

Weakness: Missing punctuation and word errors \rightarrow Your sentence runs together without proper punctuation, and you've used "so" instead of "to" and "to" instead of "too." These small errors distract from your creative ideas.

Exemplar: "The doughnuts couldn't agree on what to do, so they decided to vote. The options were: a contest to see who could roll the furthest, a battle to see who could knock down the most donuts, or a soccer match using Ben as the ball because he was too fat."

■ Your story has wonderful imagination and creativity that makes it fun to read. The idea of donuts coming alive after closing time is original and entertaining. However, your writing would be much stronger if you focused on making your sentences flow better together and checking your grammar carefully. Additionally, try to give more details about how things look, sound, and feel to help readers picture the scene better. Also, work on connecting your ideas more clearly so readers can follow your story without getting confused.
