#1 (First paragraph) Strengths: Your opening effectively establishes the main character and creates curiosity with the shadow discovery. The sensory details like "rays of golden sunlight" help readers visualize the scene.

Sentence structure issue \rightarrow Your sentences follow similar patterns with many adjectives and adverbs clustered together. This creates a rushed feeling rather than allowing readers to experience each important moment. For example, in "He groggily jolted upright and rubbed the sleep out of his eyes," followed by "His stomach grumbled voraciously," the similar structure makes the writing feel repetitive. *Jim jolted awake and rubbed his eyes. His stomach grumbled loudly—he hadn't eaten since yesterday.*

#2 (Second paragraph) Strengths: You've developed an interesting relationship between Jim and his shadow. The personification of the shadow gives your story a creative fantasy element.

Point of view shifts \rightarrow Your writing suddenly changes from third-person ("Jim was questioned") to first-person ("I felt a beaming sense") without clear transition. This confuses readers about who is telling the story. For instance, when you write "his cheeks gushed and he felt butterflies," but later write "I felt a beaming sense of pride," readers become disoriented. Jim felt a beaming sense of pride as the reporters interviewed him. Everyone called him a hero, but he knew it would have been impossible without his shadow.

#3 (Final paragraph) Strengths: Your conclusion creates emotional impact with Jim's feelings about his shadow leaving. The friendship theme comes through strongly.

Abrupt ending \rightarrow The final paragraph resolves too quickly without fully exploring Jim's emotions or providing closure about why the shadow left. The ending "That night, I slept disheartened, but glad for my comrade" leaves readers with questions about what happens next. That night, as I lay in bed watching the moonlight create new shadows on my wall, I felt both sad and proud. My shadow had helped me become brave enough to stand on my own. Perhaps that's why it had to leave.

■ Your piece has a creative concept about a boy and his living shadow that shows good imagination. You could improve by slowing down important moments and using more consistent viewpoints throughout your story. Also, try adding more dialogue between Jim and his shadow to show their relationship developing. Adding a clearer reason for why the shadow leaves at the end would help readers feel more satisfied with the ending. Remember to check if you're writing in first person ("I") or third person ("he") and stick with one choice.
