## **Section 1:**

Strengths: Your opening creates an excellent eerie atmosphere with vivid sensory details ("Dark and icy"). The mysterious figure immediately hooks the reader's attention.

Weakness: Underdeveloped character introduction  $\rightarrow$  While you introduce Luna, we learn very little about her personality or character traits beyond her age. Phrases like "the short, 7 year old girl" and her casual dismissal of the strange occurrence don't give us enough insight into who she is as a person.

Exemplar: Luna clutched her school bag tighter, her curious eyes scanning the empty street as she continued her journey, attempting to shake off the strange sensation—after all, an imaginative seven-year-old often saw things others didn't.

#2: "As Luna ran through the school gates to join in the game of "Tag," she noticed something extremely off. The scorching rays of the sun were burning her back mercilessly, yet her shadow was nowhere to be seen. Taking a glance at the people around her, she realized that she was the only one without a shadow. "Where is it?" Luna wondered. Suddenly, the lightbulb above her head lit up. Everything made sense."

Strengths: Your reveal of the missing shadow is well-executed and provides an excellent central conflict. The contrast between the bright sun and missing shadow creates a powerful image.

Weakness: Rushed realization moment → Luna's epiphany happens too quickly. The phrase "Suddenly, the lightbulb above her head lit up. Everything made sense" doesn't allow readers to experience her thought process or the gradual building of her realization.

Exemplar: Luna stared at the ground where her shadow should have been, her mind racing as the pieces slowly came together—the cold touch, the eerie presence, the sensation of being followed. "My shadow," she whispered, her eyes widening with understanding.

#3: "Her little legs started to whirl like a windmill, and in no time, Luna felt the cool air-conditioning from the library. The sweet aroma of freshly baked pastry wafted up her nostril, and Luna had the urge to slump in a rickety chair with an iced lemonade and mouth-watering chocolate cupcake. Strengths: Your sensory details in the library scene create a vivid environment. The description of temptation adds depth to Luna's determination.

Weakness: Disconnected sensory information  $\rightarrow$  The details about pastries and lemonade, while vivid, distract from the urgent shadow problem rather than advancing the plot. These sensory elements don't connect meaningfully to Luna's quest to solve her shadow problem.

Exemplar: Luna rushed into the library, barely noticing the cool air washing over her as her eyes scanned the towering bookshelves—somewhere in this vast collection of knowledge must be the answer to why her faithful shadow had abandoned her.

■ Your piece features a wonderfully creative premise with the shadow abandoning its owner. The concept provides an excellent opportunity for a meaningful message about appreciation. However, your story would benefit from deeper character development for Luna. We need to understand more about her personality and typical behaviour to fully appreciate how this experience changes her. The pacing also feels rushed, particularly in how quickly Luna solves the mystery and in the conclusion where we don't actually see how she changes her behaviour toward her shadow. You could improve this by adding a scene showing Luna actively trying to win back her shadow's trust. Also, consider exploring Luna's emotional journey more thoroughly. How did she feel when she first realized her shadow was gone? Was she frightened, confused, or perhaps initially excited? Showing these emotions would strengthen the reader's connection with your character and deepen the impact of your story's message.
