You mention that "some may argue that exams can also teach skills like time management," but you could explore this opposing viewpoint more thoroughly before explaining why your position is stronger. Your emotional language is engaging, but your argument would be more convincing with more factual support. Try adding a sentence or two about schools that have already implemented project-based learning successfully to show that your ideas have practical applications.
