#1 Strengths:

- You've established a clear thesis that traditional exams should be replaced with project-based assignments.
- Your opening scene creates a vivid image of the exam environment that many readers can relate to.

Weakness: Incomplete argument development → Your first paragraph introduces three main arguments against exams, but doesn't clearly explain the benefits of project-based assignments. The claim that "a better way of doing exams is to set project based assignments" needs more supporting evidence about why this alternative is superior. Phrases like "But this, should be changed" would be stronger with specific evidence about project-based assessment benefits.

Exemplar: *A better approach would be project-based assignments, which research shows develop critical thinking skills while reducing student anxiety and making better use of learning time.*

#2 Strengths:

- You make a valid point about the stressful atmosphere of traditional exams.
- You effectively use questioning to engage the reader in considering how exams feel.

Weakness: Repetitive reasoning → Your paragraph makes the same point multiple times about silence and stress without introducing different aspects of exam stress. Phrases like "everyone's tense" and "How would you feel? Stressed, or not" repeat similar ideas without developing the argument further. The paragraph would be stronger if you explored different types of stress beyond the silent atmosphere.

Exemplar: *Beyond the tense atmosphere, exams create unhealthy pressure through their high-stakes nature - a single poor performance can significantly impact a student's academic record, causing anxiety that actually prevents them from demonstrating their true understanding.*

#3 Strengths:

- You highlight the social skills development that project-based work can foster.
- You address a potential counterargument about group exams, showing awareness of different perspectives.

Weakness: Limited exploration of project benefits → While you mention teamwork, you don't fully explore the range of skills developed through project-based assignments. Phrases like "you collaborate,

you work together all the time" could be expanded to discuss specific skills like leadership, conflict resolution, or creative problem-solving that projects develop, which are valuable for future careers.

Exemplar: *Project-based assignments prepare students for real-world challenges by requiring them to distribute tasks based on individual strengths, resolve disagreements constructively, and present their findings professionally - all skills that employers consistently rank as essential in the workplace.*

■ Your piece makes a passionate case against traditional exams, but could be strengthened with more specific evidence. Try focusing on the educational benefits of project-based learning beyond just saving time and reducing stress. You could improve your first paragraph by clearly outlining what project-based assignments actually involve and how they work. Additionally, consider addressing how project-based assignments might be assessed fairly. Your second paragraph contains several questions that could be replaced with evidence about how exams impact learning outcomes. Also, you might want to acknowledge situations where some form of individual assessment might still be valuable. Your conclusion could be more impactful if you summarised your strongest points and added a memorable final thought about how this change would benefit education in the long term.
