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## Section 1:

## Strengths:

- Vivid sensory details that capture the intense cold and visual beauty
- Effective contrast between physical discomfort and overwhelming beauty

Tense consistency → Your writing shifts between past and present tense in this section. You begin with "hit" (past tense) but then use "reaching" (present participle). This creates confusion about when the experience occurred.

Exemplar: The air hit us like a hurricane entity – a thousand tiny daggers pricking our skin. Yet, the discomfort was instantly swept away by the sheer beauty of the landscape. Towering icebergs and vast patches of cerulean and white snow reached farther than our eyes could see.

## Strengths:

- Delightful use of simile comparing penguins to "clumsy gentlemen in tuxedos"
- Connects the wildlife observation to human emotions through classmates' reactions

Sentence structure  $\rightarrow$  This sentence contains too many ideas packed together. The multiple clauses make it difficult to follow your main point about the penguin observation.

Exemplar: We watched penguins waddle like clumsy gentlemen in tuxedos. Their belly-slides across the snow brought gales of laughter from even our most stoic classmate.

#3 "Antarctica left an image of itself on our souls. It wasn't just the breathtaking landscapes or the unique wildlife, it was the deep sense of connection to something ancient and powerful."

## Strengths:

- Thoughtful reflection showing personal impact beyond just sightseeing
- Effective use of abstract concepts (connection, ancient, powerful) to convey deeper meaning

Vague language → Your reflection uses abstract terms without specific details that show how Antarctica affected you personally or what you learned from the experience.

Exemplar: Antarctica carved itself into our souls. Beyond the breathtaking landscapes and unique wildlife, we felt a deep connection to Earth's history as we stood where few humans have ventured, humbled by three-kilometre-thick ice that has existed for millions of years.

■ Your piece has wonderful descriptive language that brings Antarctica to life through vivid imagery and sensory details. The personal connection you feel to this special place shines through, especially in your descriptions of wildlife encounters and icy landscapes. To improve the substance of your writing, focus on developing a clearer structure with a stronger beginning and conclusion. Your opening paragraph could better establish why this journey was significant, perhaps mentioning what you hoped to learn or experience. Additionally, you could strengthen the educational aspects by including 1-2 specific facts you learned about Antarctica's ecosystem or climate. The ending feels rushed with the Superman reference that doesn't connect well with your earlier reflections. Try expanding on how this experience changed your perspective or inspired future actions. Also, consider adding more about your interactions with classmates during this shared adventure to add depth to the human element of your story.
