Section 1:

Strengths: Your opening creates immediate tension and draws readers in with action. The contrast between silence and screaming effectively shows the sudden change in atmosphere.

Weakness: Unclear scene establishment \rightarrow Your writing jumps straight into action without helping readers understand where James is or what's happening around him. The phrase "everyone was running for their lives" feels disconnected because we don't know how serious the danger actually is or what the stadium looks like during this moment.

Exemplar: James watched from the stands as the first crash of thunder silenced the crowd of thousands, but only briefly—moments later, screams echoed across the stadium.

#2 - Middle section: "James waited in the shelter, as he looked up at the skies. The dark, grey clouds swirled above like a dome of darkness, enclosing the stadium. Lightning flashed as thunder boomed, and the clouds illuminated, bright as the moon."

Strengths: Your descriptive language creates a vivid picture of the storm. The comparison to "a dome of darkness" helps readers visualise the scene effectively.

Weakness: Repetitive sentence structure \rightarrow Your sentences follow the same pattern throughout this section, making the writing feel choppy. Phrases like "Lightning flashed as thunder boomed" and "James waited in the shelter, as he looked up" use similar constructions that don't flow smoothly together.

Exemplar: While James waited in the shelter, the dark grey clouds swirled above like a dome of darkness, enclosing the stadium as lightning illuminated them bright as the moon.

#3 - Conclusion: "James lifted his head and stared at the storm. Something was odd about it, it didn't seem natural... Without a single bit of hesitation, he lifted his hands, and ripped the paper out from the notebook."

Strengths: Your story includes an interesting twist with James having magical powers. The ending shows character growth as James learns from his experience.

Weakness: Rushed plot development \rightarrow Your magical revelation happens too quickly without proper build-up. The connection between James's predictions and the storm isn't clearly explained, and phrases like "without a single bit of hesitation" suggest he immediately understands something that readers haven't been prepared for.

Exemplar: As James stared at the storm, a chilling realisation crept over him—what if his careless predictions had somehow caused this chaos?

■ Your piece shows creativity with an engaging supernatural twist, but the story needs more development to help readers follow along. The magical element feels sudden because you haven't given enough hints earlier about James's special abilities. Additionally, your writing would benefit from varying sentence lengths and structures to create better flow. The dialogue between characters is missing, which could help show James's relationships with his family and make the story feel more realistic. Also, you could expand on James's emotions throughout the story—how does he feel when he realises his predictions might be real? Furthermore, the setting needs clearer description so readers can picture the stadium and shelter more easily. Your conclusion teaches a good lesson about responsibility, but you could strengthen this by showing more of James's thought process as he figures out his powers.
