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Section 1:

Strengths: Your evocative imagery creates a powerful visual that immediately draws readers in. The contrast between the ocean's beauty and human impact is effectively established.

Spelling/Grammar \rightarrow You have several spelling and punctuation errors that distract from your powerful message. The incorrect spelling of "i" instead of "I" and missing spaces after full stops reduce the impact of your writing.

Strengths: Your inclusion of specific facts about the ocean's importance gives your argument weight. The closing sentence about losing balance is particularly impactful.

Clarity of Information \rightarrow Several typing errors and unclear phrasing make your important points difficult to understand. The phrase "feels billion and trillions" likely means "feeds billions and trillions" but reads confusingly.

The sea provides over 50% of our oxygen that we breathe. It absorbs a massive amount of carbon dioxide, helping the Earth maintain its climate. It feeds billions of people across the world and fuels economies globally. When sea life dies, we lose more than just beauty—we lose balance.

#3 "So now, the ocean has suffered enough. The ocean is calling, will we answer? The next time your at the beach will you throw your rubbish in the bin?"

Strengths: Your concluding questions effectively challenge the reader to take action. The personification of the ocean "calling" creates emotional impact.

Conclusion Development \rightarrow Your conclusion feels rushed and doesn't fully reinforce your main arguments. The final question about rubbish focuses on only one small action when your piece discusses much larger issues.

The ocean has suffered enough from our neglect. It's calling for our help—will we answer? The next time you're at the beach, will you throw your rubbish in the bin? Will you speak up for marine protection? Our blue planet's future depends on the choices we make today.

■ Your piece shows passion for ocean conservation, which comes through clearly in your emotive language. To strengthen your writing, try developing a clearer structure with an introduction that states your main argument, body paragraphs that each focus on one key point, and a conclusion that reinforces these points. Your persuasive tone works well, but adding more specific examples of how pollution affects marine life would make your argument more compelling. Additionally, varying your sentence structure would improve the flow of your writing. Some sentences are quite short while others run on without proper punctuation. Try combining some shorter sentences and breaking up longer ones. You could also strengthen your piece by including a specific call to action beyond just binning rubbish—perhaps suggesting ways young people can get involved in ocean conservation efforts in their local communities.
