Section 1:

Additionally, consider organising your ideas more clearly by using topic sentences that preview the main point of each paragraph. Your writing uses creative language, but sometimes the informal tone ("wayyy better") might make your argument seem less serious. Try to maintain a consistent, persuasive tone throughout your piece.
