## Strengths:

Sentence structure → Your sentences are quite abrupt and there are several grammatical errors that distract from your message. "But what if I told you a simple piece of rubbish you throw becomes a major problem" contains multiple spelling and grammar mistakes.

## Strengths:

- You provide important facts that show why the ocean matters to human survival
- You address a potential question from the reader, creating dialogue

Logical development → Your paragraph jumps quickly between ideas without fully developing each point. You mention the ocean as "our life source" but don't clearly connect this to your previous statements.

***"You might be wondering why we should care about the ocean. We should care because together, we can make a real difference by doing the right thing. The ocean isn't just a beautiful mystery with undiscovered treasures—it's our life source. Studies have shown that over 50% of our oxygen comes from the ocean, making it as important as rainforests for our ability to breathe."***

**#3 "When sea life dies, we lose more than just beauty, we lose balance."**

## Strengths:

- Your sentence is concise and impactful
- You effectively link aesthetic value with ecological importance

Development of ideas → This powerful statement stands alone without sufficient elaboration. You introduce an important concept about ecological balance but don't explain how this balance works or what specific consequences its loss would have.

***"When sea life dies, we lose more than just beauty—we lose the delicate balance of our ocean ecosystems. This balance keeps our food chains working properly, maintains water quality, and helps regulate our global climate. Each species plays a vital role in maintaining this balance."***

■ Your piece shows passion for ocean conservation and includes some compelling emotional appeals. To improve its impact, try developing your ideas more fully with specific examples. For instance, you could mention particular marine animals that are threatened or explain exactly how plastic pollution harms sea creatures. Your writing would benefit from more careful proofreading to fix spelling and grammar errors that distract from your message. Additionally, try connecting your paragraphs with smoother transitions so your ideas flow better from one to the next. You could also strengthen your conclusion by including a specific call to action beyond just putting rubbish in bins—perhaps suggesting ways students can reduce plastic use or participate in beach clean-ups. Your writing has a strong emotional core, but adding these concrete details would make your argument even more persuasive and memorable.
