The phrase "froze suddenly and quickly" uses two words that mean almost the same thing. Also, "The thunder and lighting spinning and dancing through the stadium roaring, screaming" is missing connecting words, so it's unclear who or what is doing the roaring and screaming.

Strengths: You're showing how quickly the situation changed, which helps build excitement. The idea of comparing the crowd size before and after is clever.

Weakness: Confusing Word Choices → Your sentences are muddled and repeat the same ideas. "From millions of people watching had now became hundreds" doesn't make grammatical sense. The phrase "less than half the seats were less than a half empty" is very confusing because it repeats "less than half" in a way that doesn't make sense.

Exemplar: "The millions of spectators had dwindled to mere hundreds. More than half the seats now sat empty."

#3 "Hannah and Lilly would of left hours ago but they would have another gigantic problem to think about the bus."

Strengths: You're thinking ahead to show the characters' dilemma about leaving, which adds realism to the story.

Weakness: Grammar Mistakes → "Would of" should be "would have," and the sentence structure makes it hard to understand. The sentence also doesn't clearly explain what the bus problem actually is.

Exemplar: "Hannah and Lilly would have left hours ago, but they faced another enormous problem: getting to the bus."

However, your writing needs work on making sentences clearer and easier to follow. Many of your sentences are jumbled or use incorrect grammar, which makes it hard for readers to understand what's happening. Additionally, you could improve by adding more details about what Hannah and Lilly are thinking and feeling, rather than just describing the action around them. The story moves very quickly, but it would be stronger if you slowed down and explained things more clearly. Also, you should work on connecting your ideas better - right now, the story jumps from one thing to another without smooth transitions. Finally, the ending feels rushed and doesn't clearly explain how the characters solved their bus problem or what happened next.
