Exemplar: He looked down at the crystal pendant resting in his lap—the same one he'd discovered on his bed the night before, pulsing with a soft blue light that now blazed like a tiny star.

#3 - "Walking to the centre of the stadium, he jumped up as high as he could, trying to let the crystal take control. And it did."

Strengths: Your short sentence "And it did" creates dramatic impact and shows James's decision has immediate consequences. The action moves the plot forward quickly.

Weakness: Unclear motivation \rightarrow You mention James wants his memories to become clear, but it's not obvious why jumping up would help achieve this goal. The connection between his actions and his reasoning needs to be stronger for readers to follow his logic.

Exemplar: Walking to the centre of the stadium, he raised the pendant high above his head and leaped upwards, hoping the crystal's pull towards the storm would unlock the swirling memories in his mind.

Furthermore, describing the storm and pendant with more precise details would strengthen the magical atmosphere you're creating. Consider expanding on how James feels physically during these supernatural events, as this would help readers connect with his experience. Your story has excellent potential, and focusing on these areas would make it even more compelling for your audience.
