Section 1:

#1: Opening paragraph - "The first crash of thunder silenced the crowd..."

Strengths: Your opening creates immediate tension and sets a dramatic scene. The sensory details like "thunder roared" and "lightning ripped" help readers visualise the storm's power.

Weakness: Unclear sentence structure → Several sentences contain confusing grammar that makes them hard to follow. For example, "Disorted luminosity flickered across upturned faces" uses an unclear word choice, and "The air tingled with electricity. Somewhat anticipation. Yet no feeling that could be explained" creates incomplete thoughts that break the flow.

Exemplar: "Distorted light flickered across the upturned faces of spectators. The air crackled with electricity and a strange sense of anticipation that Sophie couldn't quite explain."

#2: Sophie's memories - "In contrast to the stadium's chaos, Sophie remained planted..."

Strengths: You effectively contrast Sophie's stillness with the chaos around her. The emotional connection to her father through the empty seat and ticket creates sympathy for the character.

Weakness: Awkward phrasing and word choices → Phrases like "proclaimed her dad's absence" and "Her breath was caught in her throat, forming a lump" sound unnatural. The sentence structure often feels forced rather than flowing smoothly.

Exemplar: "The empty seat beside her reminded Sophie of her father's absence. A lump formed in her throat as she traced the ticket's torn edge with trembling fingers."

#3: The discovery scene - "She unfloded the crease on her ticket..."

Strengths: The physical action of digging creates suspense and shows Sophie's determination. The compass discovery provides a meaningful connection to her father's memory.

Weakness: Technical errors disrupt meaning → Multiple spelling mistakes like "unfloded," "layed," and "Bethoven" distract from the story. Grammar problems such as "Two feet below her, she scraped a cold object" create confusion about what's happening.

Exemplar: "She unfolded the creased ticket, revealing coordinates written in her father's handwriting. Two feet beneath the surface, her fingers found something cold and metallic."

■ Your piece shows creativity in linking a storm to a personal mystery, and you've chosen an engaging setting that many readers can connect with. The emotional core about Sophie's

relationship with her father gives the story heart. However, your writing would benefit from clearer sentence construction and careful proofreading. Many sentences try to pack in too many ideas at once, making them confusing to read. Additionally, focus on using simpler, more natural phrasing that flows better. Your story has good bones, but the technical errors prevent readers from fully enjoying the plot. Also, work on making your transitions between paragraphs smoother so the story moves more naturally from one moment to the next. The ending feels rushed compared to the detailed opening, so consider developing the discovery scene further to match the careful attention you gave to setting up the storm.
