#1: Opening paragraph - bag preparation and anticipation Strengths: Your piece creates immediate engagement through the personification of the bag as "a loyal pet waiting to be taken along," which effectively conveys Liam's excitement. The detail about hiding the teddy bear shows authentic childhood behaviour and establishes character depth.

Weakness: Sentence structure imbalance → Your opening relies heavily on simple sentence constructions that create a choppy rhythm. The phrase "At the last minute, he tucked his old teddy between his jumpers" feels disconnected from the previous sentences and disrupts the flow.

Exemplar: At the last minute, he carefully tucked his old teddy between his jumpers, ensuring it remained completely hidden beneath everything else, just in case he needed the comfort during the night.

#2: Car journey and arrival at Josh's house Strengths: Your writing effectively captures nervous anticipation through specific details like fumbling with shoelaces and the welcoming imagery of "bright red door and flower pots with smiling sunflowers." The sensory detail of cookies "that smelled like melted chocolate and something warm and buttery" creates vivid atmosphere.

Weakness: Transition gaps \rightarrow The shift from car journey thoughts to arrival feels abrupt. Your writing jumps from internal worries directly to the house description without connecting these moments smoothly.

Exemplar: As the car pulled into the driveway, Liam's worries began to fade when he spotted Josh's house with its bright red door and cheerful flower pots filled with smiling sunflowers.

#3: Night-time anxiety and resolution Strengths: Your piece demonstrates sophisticated emotional complexity by contrasting daytime confidence with night-time vulnerability. The metaphor "thoughts ran around in his head like marbles" effectively conveys restless anxiety, and the circular return to positive memories shows good structural awareness.

Weakness: Repetitive phrasing patterns \rightarrow Your writing overuses similar sentence beginnings, particularly "What" questions and "Maybe" statements. The phrase "just in case" appears twice in close proximity, creating unnecessary repetition.

Exemplar: While questions tumbled through his mind—wondering about the time and whether Mum was still awake—he remembered the warmth of Josh's friendship and the joy they'd shared building their fort.

■ Your piece demonstrates strong emotional authenticity and genuine understanding of childhood experiences. The character of Liam feels believable, and you've captured the complex emotions surrounding first sleepovers effectively. However, your writing would benefit from more sophisticated sentence structures and smoother transitions between scenes. Consider varying your sentence beginnings to create better rhythm and flow. Additionally, work on connecting your paragraphs more seamlessly—each scene should naturally lead to the next. Your dialogue and sensory details are particularly strong, so continue developing these elements. Also, try expanding some of your shorter sentences into more complex structures that can carry deeper meaning. The emotional arc of your story works well, moving from anticipation through enjoyment to anxiety and finally acceptance, but strengthening the connections between these stages will make your narrative more cohesive and engaging for readers.
