#1 "Why do we need education? Why is school so important? We always go to school from Monday to Friday so that we can have an easier life in the future."

Strengths: Your opening questions grab the reader's attention right away. You clearly state the main idea about school helping our future lives.

Weakness: Lack of detailed reasoning → Your writing jumps straight to saying school makes life easier without explaining how or why this happens. The phrase "so that we can have an easier life in the future" needs more support and examples to help readers understand what you mean by "easier life."

Exemplar: *School helps us learn important skills like reading, writing, and problem-solving that we need for jobs and daily activities when we grow up.*

#2 "Teachers were also kids before and learnt lots of knowledge. Now, teachers pass on everything they have learnt to students! They teach kids things of all sort."

Strengths: You show good understanding that teachers were once students too. Your enthusiasm comes through with the exclamation mark.

Weakness: Vague descriptions → The phrases "lots of knowledge" and "things of all sort" don't tell readers what specific subjects or skills teachers actually share. Your writing would be stronger with concrete examples of what teachers teach.

Exemplar: *Teachers pass on specific skills like mathematics, science, history, and creative writing that help students understand the world around them.*

#3 "Like if we learn science then it's easier to be a scientist or if we learnt maths then it's easier to become a mathematician."

Strengths: You provide clear examples that connect school subjects to future careers. Your logic shows good cause-and-effect thinking.

Weakness: Simple connections → Your examples only show the most obvious job connections and don't explore how subjects help in many different ways. The phrase "it's easier to be a scientist" doesn't explain the specific skills science teaches that make someone successful.

Exemplar: *Learning science teaches us to ask questions, test ideas, and solve problems - skills that help in many jobs like medicine, engineering, and even cooking.*

■ Your piece shows you understand why education matters, but it needs more depth in your explanations. Right now, your writing tells readers what happens but doesn't fully explain how education actually works to help us. Additionally, your examples focus only on obvious career connections when education helps us in many other ways too. Also, your sentences would flow better with stronger connecting words between ideas. Furthermore, adding specific examples of skills we learn would make your writing more convincing. You could improve by expanding on how subjects like English help us communicate better or how history teaches us about making good choices. Moreover, explaining how education helps with everyday problems, not just future jobs, would strengthen your argument.
