

**Emergency Planning:** If running behind by minute 30, prioritise a strong conclusion over perfect body paragraphs.

Open with the climactic moment, then flashback to explain how you got there. Creates immediate engagement and tension.

#### **Parallel Structure**

Two storylines running simultaneously that converge at the end. Shows sophisticated narrative control.



# **Precision vs Complexity**

Choose words that enhance meaning, not just impress markers. Every sophisticated word choice should serve a purpose:

#### **Effective Use**

"The government's reluctance to address climate change demonstrates a concerning shortsightedness that jeopardises our collective future."

Each word adds specific meaning and emotional weight.

#### Ineffective Use

"The governmental establishment's reticent predisposition towards ameliorating environmental perturbations manifests deleterious ramifications."

Overly complex without adding clarity or meaning.

# **Narrative Writing Traps**

# The "Dream Ending" Disaster

Ending with "it was all a dream" is the fastest way to lose marks for resolution and ideas.

Why it fails: Shows inability to resolve conflict creatively and frustrates readers who invested in the story.

#### **Character Development Failures**

Too Many Characters: Multiple characters in 40 minutes leads to shallow development

Stereotypes: Relying on clichéd character types without depth

No Growth: Characters remain static throughout the story

**Inconsistent Voice:** Character personality changes without reason

#### **Plot Problems**

No Clear Conflict: Events happen without central problem

**Unresolved Issues:** Raising problems but not addressing them

Coincidence Resolutions: Problems solved by luck rather than character action

Over-Complexity: Too many plot threads for the time limit

# **Evidence and Support Issues**

Vague Statistics: "Many studies show..." without specifics

Personal Opinion as Fact: Presenting preferences as universal truths

Weak Examples: Using hypothetical or irrelevant examples

**No Counter-Arguments:** Ignoring opposing viewpoints entirely

# **Language and Tone Problems**

Overly Casual: Using slang or conversational tone inappropriately

**Aggressive Language:** Attacking opposing views rather than refuting them

Absolute Statements: Using "always," "never," "all," "none" without qualification

Emotional Manipulation: Relying solely on emotion without logical support

# **Technical Writing Errors**

#### **High-Impact Technical Mistakes**

These errors can significantly impact multiple assessment criteria:

#### **Sentence Structure**

# **Recovery Strategies**

#### **When Things Go Wrong Mid-Test**

#### If You're Behind Schedule:

Prioritise completing structure over perfect details

Write shorter but complete paragraphs Ensure you have a conclusion, even if brief Focus on clear, correct sentences over complex ones

#### If You Make Major Errors:

Don't waste time with extensive crossing out Draw a single line through errors and continue

Use editing time to fix critical mistakes first Remember: partial credit is better than no completion
