Score 1 Very Short Script, Few Content Words

Basic content words only, very limited vocabulary range.

Examples: big, run, look, red, water, man

Score 2 Simple Words with Some Precise Choices

Mostly simple verbs, adjectives, nouns. May include 2-3 precise words and basic figurative language.

Examples: beautiful, scream, grab, huge; "as big as a house"

Score 3 Precise Words and Effective Figurative Language

Clear use of precise vocabulary and some effective figurative language.

Examples: hissed, yanked, clutched, exhilarating; "lungs screamed for air"

Score 4 Sustained Precise Language

Consistent use of precise words that enhance meaning. Includes attitudinal, evaluative, and technical vocabulary.
