Section 1

#1: Opening paragraph

Strengths:

- Your opening creates mystery effectively by hiding the source of fascination in a pouch, which makes readers curious about what's inside.
- The descriptive details about the coin (rose gold, eroded engravings, fox and pine tree symbols) paint a vivid picture.

Unnatural phrasing → The phrase "attracted laughter and fascination wherever she went" feels awkward because we don't yet know why this happens. The opening sentence promises something but doesn't connect clearly to what follows. Additionally, "its engravings eroded with decades of fingers" uses unusual wording—engravings don't erode "with" fingers, they erode "from" or "by" handling. The phrase "helped her decide to take a risk" is also grammatically incomplete; it should explain how the coin helped (perhaps "helped her decide whether to take a risk").

Exemplar: "Thalia Fox carried a secret in the worn pouch around her neck—a rose gold coin whose engravings had faded from years of handling."

#2: The discovery scene (first and second paragraphs)

Strengths:

- Your description of Thalia's emotional escalation is strong, showing panic through physical details like her eyes changing colour.
- The progression from discovering the coin is missing to realising the necklace is gone too creates good tension.

Rushed emotional development → The panic feels too sudden and extreme without enough build-up. You jump from "extremely unexpected" to "round holes of horror" very quickly. The scene would benefit from showing more of Thalia's thought process—perhaps a moment where she checks again, or tries to remember when she last saw the items. Also, Charlotte's entrance feels too convenient and her reaction ("you look like you need some air") doesn't match the severity of what's happening—the room is destroyed and Thalia is clearly devastated.

Exemplar: "Thalia checked the pouch again, her fingers trembling as they found only empty fabric. She tipped it upside down, shaking it hard. Her sapphire necklace should have fallen out, but nothing came. Both were gone."

#3: The resolution (final paragraph)

Strengths:

- Your message about self-reliance and bravery comes through clearly.
- The connection between Thalia's fear and her dependence on the coin is well-drawn.

Underdeveloped realisation → The ending feels too quick and neat. Thalia's transformation from someone who depends on a coin for every decision to someone who embraces independence happens in just a few sentences after one ride. This is a major character change that needs more time to develop. You tell us "Thalia understood" but don't show us the thinking that led to this understanding. What specific thoughts went through her mind? Did she remember other times she was afraid? The leap from "I went on a scary ride" to "I don't need my lucky charm anymore" is too large without more steps in between.

Exemplar: "As Thalia caught her breath, something clicked in her mind. She'd chosen to go on the ride herself—no coin flip, no excuse if it went wrong. The decision had been completely hers, and she'd survived. More than survived—she'd loved it. Maybe, she thought, she'd been hiding behind that coin for too long."

Your story has a clear structure and an important message about independence and self-confidence. The concept of a lucky charm that prevents someone from making their own choices is creative and relatable for young readers. However, your piece would be stronger if you slowed down the storytelling. Right now, events happen very quickly—Thalia loses her items, goes to the fair, has one experience, and completely changes her thinking. Real change takes time.

Think about adding more scenes that show Thalia struggling with decisions at the fair. Perhaps she faces several small choices before the big ride, and each time she reaches for her pouch and must stop herself. This would make her final realisation feel more earned. Additionally, your descriptions sometimes use complex phrases that don't quite work ("amber eyes dilating to a panicked brown so dark that it was almost black"). When describing emotions, simpler and clearer language often works better than trying to create elaborate images.

Also, consider developing Charlotte's character more. Right now, she appears when convenient but doesn't feel like a real person. What does she think about Thalia's coin obsession? Has she noticed it before? Does she deliberately choose the scary ride to help her friend, or is it just coincidence? Answering these questions would add depth to your story. Finally, the flashback technique interrupts the flow—you could simply describe Thalia's feelings during the ride without the "FLASHBACK" and "BACK TO THE PRESENT" labels, which would make the reading experience smoother.
