#1: "Homework causes stress and anxiety on top of that homework takes away free and family time which to many is very precious."

Strengths:

- You've identified two important concerns that many students genuinely experience

Strengths:

Additionally, your paragraphs would flow better if you connected your ideas more smoothly. Notice how your second paragraph jumps straight into "Homework causes stress" without linking back to your introduction. Try using phrases like "Firstly" or "One major concern is" to guide your reader through your argument. Also, your final paragraph introduces new ideas about alternatives but doesn't fully explore them—consider expanding on one or two examples rather than just mentioning several points quickly. The strongest improvement you could make is adding real examples and specific scenarios that help your reader understand and feel the

problems you're describing. Your conclusion also feels a bit rushed; instead of repeating earlier points, try leaving your reader with a powerful final thought about why this issue truly matters for students' wellbeing.
