#1 (Introduction paragraph)

Strengths: Your opening clearly states the main argument and provides a good overview of the benefits. You've used effective topic sentences that preview what's coming next.

Lack of specific detail → Your introduction mentions general benefits but doesn't include concrete examples or statistics. Phrases like "many reasons" and "greater sense of safety" are quite vague. To strengthen this section, you could add specific details such as mentioning particular accident statistics or describing exactly how flashing lights work.

Exemplar: *"According to traffic safety studies, pedestrian crossings with flashing lights reduce accidents by 40% in school zones, giving children clear signals about when it's safe to cross."*

#2 (Second paragraph beginning with "First of all...")

Unclear reasoning → The logic connecting "oblivious of dangers" to how flashing lights specifically help isn't fully developed. Your phrase "young students are often oblivious of the dangers that surround them at schools" needs better explanation of what these dangers are and how the lights address them specifically.

Exemplar: *"Young students often focus on friends and activities rather than watching for cars, so bright flashing lights catch their attention and remind them to stop and look before crossing."*

#3 (Final paragraph beginning with "Lastly...")

Strengths: You've identified multiple benefits of walking to school and connected them well to the main topic. The link between safety and encouraging walking is logical.

Inconsistent capitalisation → Your sentence contains an error where "Reduces" should not be capitalised mid-sentence. Additionally, the phrase "connect with nature each day,over time" has missing spacing and creates confusion in your flow of ideas.

Exemplar: *"Walking to school provides regular physical exercise, reduces traffic congestion and harmful emissions, and gives children the chance to enjoy fresh air. Over time, these daily walks build healthier habits."*

Also, consider adding more details about what makes school zones particularly dangerous without these safety measures. Your conclusion ties everything together nicely, but the body paragraphs could use more depth and specific supporting details to make your arguments more convincing.
