Section 1

#1: Opening Paragraph

Strengths:

- You've created a warm and welcoming tone that connects with your audience emotionally, particularly through the phrase "Australia is not just a country—it's a feeling of connection."
- Your leadership philosophy of serving "with you" rather than above your audience shows humility and collaboration.

Vague Leadership Vision → Whilst your opening establishes a friendly tone, it lacks specific examples of what "making Australia better" actually means in practice. Phrases like "where everyone feels safe and included" and "a place that everyone calls home" are broad statements that don't tell your audience exactly what changes they can expect. Without concrete details early on, your readers might wonder what makes your vision different from any other candidate's promises.

Exemplar: "To me, Australia means building a nation where emergency healthcare workers receive fair schedules, where every child can afford school uniforms, and where our native wildlife has protected green spaces to call home."

#2: Healthcare and Education Initiatives

Strengths:

- You've shown genuine empathy by acknowledging that emergency healthcare workers "sacrifice their sleep, their cherished family memories and their personal well-being."
- Your education statistics ("Five in Ten families") help demonstrate that you understand real problems facing Australian families.

Insufficient Supporting Detail → Whilst you mention creating "rotational 4-day work weeks" and "free education and resources," you haven't explained how these programmes would actually work. For instance, how would hospitals manage staffing during the transition to 4-day weeks? Which school

items would be free – just uniforms and devices, or also textbooks and excursions? Your audience needs more information about implementation to believe these changes are possible, not just hopeful ideas.

Exemplar: "We'll introduce a trial programme in five major hospitals, partnering with nursing unions to design flexible rosters that protect both worker wellbeing and patient care, with full implementation planned within two years."

#3: Concluding River Metaphor

Strengths:

- Your extended river metaphor is creative and paints a vivid picture of unity with phrases like "flowing from our own hills, our own stories."
- The emotional appeal in your conclusion creates a memorable ending that might inspire voters.

Unclear Metaphor Connection → Whilst the river imagery is poetic, it becomes difficult to follow how it relates to your actual policies. Phrases like "deep enough to carry generations" and "wide enough to make the dreams come true of millions" sound inspiring, but your audience might lose track of your main message about healthcare, education and green spaces. The metaphor takes up considerable space without reinforcing the specific actions you've promised earlier in the speech.

Exemplar: "Together, like tributaries joining to form a mighty river, we'll combine our efforts – your votes, my leadership and our shared commitment – to deliver better healthcare, accessible education and protected green spaces for every Australian."

■ Your speech demonstrates genuine passion for Australia and concern for important issues like healthcare worker burnout, educational inequality and environmental protection. However, the content would benefit from adding more substance beneath the emotional appeals. When you describe problems, try including one or two sentences about the specific steps you'll take to solve them. For example, instead of saying you'll "boost funding for healthcare," explain where that funding will come from or how much you plan to increase it. Additionally, your green space initiative mentions 30% coverage but doesn't address how this would apply to existing suburbs – would you convert current buildings, create rooftop gardens or protect remaining bushland? Adding these practical details will help your audience trust that you've thought through these policies carefully. Also, consider

connecting your opening and closing more directly to your three main initiatives. Your river metaphor is powerful, but it could be shortened to leave more room for explaining how your healthcare, education and environmental policies will actually work. Finally, try presenting one challenge you anticipate facing and how you'd overcome it – this honesty would make your speech more believable and show that you're prepared for the real difficulties of leadership.

Good afternoon, my fellow citizens of Australia,

#1 Today I, Anshika, will be sharing with you on [about] why you should elect me as the Prime Minister of Australia. #2 One of my top concerns is for emergency healthcare workers. People who work in the emergency health care [healthcare] unit wake up every single day to save someone's life. They tirelessly sacrifice their sleep, their cherished family memories and their personal well-being to help someone else. Emergency healthcare workers don't work only for money but also to save lives. This is why I will work towards creating a more flexible and fair scheduling system, such as rotational 4-day work weeks or mandatory rest days, depending on their needs and hospital staffing. To support this, we'll boost funding for healthcare to ensure hospitals can operate smoothly and staff are properly paid. When we care for our carers, they can better care for us.

Another initiative that I would take as your Prime Minister would be to make education and resources free for all. Five in Ten [ten] families say that they are concerned about being able to afford school-related items such as uniforms and electronic devices. I believe that education should be free for all students isn't [and is not] something which shouldn't be given because of money. By giving all the kids of our country [country] free resources, they can get [receive] equal rights [opportunities] as everyone else, also reducing the bullying environment in school, a major problem that is arising. I believe by [that by] investing in every student's education, we not only create a steady future but also improve the future of our country. In the next few decades, these kids will lead our country. Each child has amazing potential and it is our job to guide them. Should a school uniform really be the reason why a child couldn't fulfil [fulfil] their dreams? Should some stationery be the reason why we lost a future lawyer or doctor?

#3 Finally, I will ensure that each suburb has at least 30% of green space. When I was younger, I saw the suburb I live in grow from a beautiful greenery to a place filled with infrastructure. The kangaroos, which once roamed around the wild bushes, were chased away from their homes, only their footprints, which were embedded in the concrete left behind [leaving only their footprints embedded in the concrete behind]. From that day, I realised that we humans are knowingly or unknowingly destroying the homes of all the other creatures we share the land with. Because of this experience, I believe that by having 30% of green space in each suburb, we not only ensure that all other habitats have somewhere to live but also that we become a sustainable and green country.

To conclude, I only ask for one thing: your trust. Trust me with your vote for Prime Minister so that we can make Australia even better. With all of our similarities and differences, from all our perspectives and backgrounds, together we can prosper. We can be a nation that doesn't connect because of the voice of one, but by the harmony of many. We are not a collection of isolated lives—we are a river. Each of us begins with a single stream, flowing from our own hills, our own stories and our own hopes.
