Section 1

#1: Opening Paragraph

Strengths:

- You've made a clear request to the mayor right from the start, making your purpose easy to understand
- Your question "If you were one of them, Mayor Chanderson, how would you feel?" helps the reader connect emotionally with the problem

Lack of Supporting Detail \rightarrow Your opening mentions plastics and river birds, but you could strengthen this by including more specific information about the situation. For example, how long has this problem been happening? Are there particular areas of the river that are most affected? Adding these details would help the mayor understand exactly why this issue needs urgent attention.

Exemplar: "Over the past two years, I have noticed plastic bottles and shopping bags accumulating along the riverbanks near Henderson Park, where local children often play."

#2: Body Paragraph Two (Teamwork and Socialisation)

Strengths:

- You've identified benefits beyond just cleaning the river, which shows you're thinking about how this programme helps people in multiple ways
- Mentioning community meetings shows you've thought about how the programme could work in practice

Unclear Connection Between Ideas → This paragraph jumps between several different points—teamwork, socialisation, giving people roles, and sharing ideas—without explaining how they link together. The sentence "We can make people socialise and give them a specific role to make them friends" is a bit confusing because it's not clear how giving someone a job helps them make friends. You need to slow down and explain your reasoning more carefully.

Exemplar: "During clean-up days, residents could work in small teams, with each team responsible for one section of the riverbank. Working together towards the same goal would naturally help people get to know their neighbours better."

#3: Final Paragraph (Conclusion)

Strengths:

- You've ended with a direct appeal to the mayor, which reminds the reader of your main request
- The idea about creating a better future for children adds emotional weight to your argument

Repetitive Phrasing Without New Information → Your conclusion repeats the same request ("hosts the awareness programmes and the clean ups days") that you've already made several times, but it doesn't add any new reasons or summarise your strongest points. A strong conclusion should remind the reader of your best arguments. Instead of just asking again, you could briefly mention the three main benefits you discussed: reducing microplastics in our food, bringing the community together, and improving tourism.

Exemplar: "By organising awareness programmes and clean-up days, we can protect our health from microplastics, strengthen community bonds, and restore the natural beauty that once attracted visitors to our area. I respectfully urge you to make this a priority."

■ Your letter does a good job of explaining why the river needs help, and you've clearly thought about different benefits of the programmes you're suggesting. However, your writing would be much stronger if you developed each idea more fully. Right now, several of your paragraphs make claims but don't explain them enough. For example, when you say "we are basically causing microplastics," you could explain exactly how this process works so the mayor really understands the problem. Additionally, your third paragraph about the economy feels rushed—you mention that the river "was widely known for the fishes and the tranquil scenery," but you don't explain how clean-up programmes would bring tourists back or help local businesses. Try to answer the question "how?" or "why?" after each claim you make. Also, some of your sentences try to do too much at once, which makes them hard to follow. Breaking longer sentences into two shorter ones often makes your point clearer. Finally, watch out for small grammar issues like "for a better future" appearing twice in different ways, and make sure each paragraph connects smoothly to the next one. Your passion for this topic really comes

through in your writing, which is excellent—now focus on building up each argument with specific details and clear explanations.
