Section 1:

#1: Introduction (Opening paragraph)

Strengths:

- Your piece opens with an engaging question that makes readers curious about your viewpoint
- You clearly state your main argument that art is the most essential school subject

Unclear Purpose Statement → While you mention you'll discuss "three things that art, drama and dance secretly do," this doesn't quite match what you actually explain in your body paragraphs. Your paragraphs focus on how each subject (art, drama, dance) helps students develop different skills, but your introduction promises something slightly different. Consider revising your purpose statement to say something like: "Today I'm going to explain how art, drama and dance each help you develop important life skills."

#2: Second body paragraph (Drama paragraph)

Strengths:

- You explain multiple benefits of drama, including confidence, communication skills, empathy and teamwork
- The Michael Cera example shows that even famous people face doubts

Vague Skill Development → When you write "Drama teaches people while they are doing drama not like art where you learn after you finish," this comparison is confusing and doesn't clearly explain what you mean. How exactly does the timing of learning differ between drama and art? This statement needs more explanation or should be removed. A clearer approach would be: "Drama helps you build confidence immediately because you practise speaking and performing in front of others during each lesson."

#3: Conclusion paragraph

Strengths:

- You encourage readers not to worry about others' opinions
- You remind readers that these subjects teach important life lessons

Rushed Ending → Your conclusion introduces new ideas about being "laughed at" and becoming "worldwide known" that weren't discussed in your body paragraphs. Your conclusion should summarise the main skills you've already explained (creativity, confidence, discipline) rather than bringing up completely different points. Try something like: "Whether you prefer art, drama or dance, each subject helps you grow in valuable ways—through creativity, confidence and discipline. These skills will benefit you throughout your life, so embrace whichever creative subjects interest you most."

■ Your piece shows enthusiasm for creative subjects and you've included some interesting examples like Vincent van Gogh and Michael Cera. However, your writing would benefit from deeper explanation of your main points. For instance, when you mention that art connects to maths through angles, you could explain *how* understanding angles in art helps with maths concepts, or give a specific example of when you used this connection. Additionally, your paragraphs sometimes jump between different ideas without smooth transitions. In your art paragraph, you move from discussing practice and improvement, to connections with other subjects, to Vincent van Gogh's story—each idea deserves its own focus before moving to the next. Also, some sentences are quite long and contain multiple ideas that could be separated for clarity. For example, "Drama teaches people to be confident when standing in front of a bunch of people doing something like a speech or an act" could be split into two sentences to make each benefit clearer. Your dance paragraph is the shortest and could be strengthened by adding more specific examples, perhaps describing what you mean by "expressing your feelings through movements" with a concrete situation. Finally, work on making your supporting evidence stronger—instead of just mentioning that Van Gogh sold only one painting, explain what lesson readers should take from this fact.
