

Section 1:

#1: Opening paragraph

- **Strengths:** Your opening directly states your position about building a police station, which helps readers understand your argument immediately. You also identify a problem (crime) that your solution aims to address.
- **Vague Problem Statement** → Your opening claims "criminals have been roaming around city streets and suburb, causing terrible things to happen everywhere," but this lacks specific detail. What kinds of crimes are occurring? How often? Without concrete examples or evidence, your argument feels unsubstantiated. Saying "they are wrong" about Australia's safety also creates confusion about who "they" refers to. Consider replacing vague phrases like "terrible things" with specific examples such as "increased break-ins" or "vandalism in public spaces" to strengthen your position.

Exemplar: Recent statistics show that property crime in suburban areas has increased by 15% over the past year, making residents feel unsafe in their own neighbourhoods.

#2: Body paragraphs (particularly paragraphs 2-4)

- **Strengths:** You provide multiple reasons supporting your argument, including employment opportunities, increased police presence, and improved working conditions. Your attempt to link police numbers to crime reduction shows logical thinking.
- **Unsupported Claims** → You make several statements without providing evidence or explanation. For instance, "A newly recruited police officer may earn up to \$200-\$300 a day" presents specific figures, but you don't explain how this supports your argument about employment. Similarly, the claim that "evil may be engulfed by good completely" is dramatic but doesn't explain how more police stations would actually reduce crime. Your reasoning needs development—explain *how* more officers lead to safer streets, not just that they will.

Exemplar: With additional officers available to patrol high-risk areas, police can respond more quickly to emergency calls and maintain a visible presence that discourages criminal activity before it occurs.

#3: Concluding paragraph

- **Strengths:** You summarise your main points clearly, reminding readers of your three key arguments.
- **Weak Connection Between Ideas** → Your conclusion simply repeats your points without explaining why a police station is specifically better than a sports complex. Throughout your piece, you never address what the sports complex would offer or why the police station is the superior choice. A persuasive argument needs to acknowledge and respond to the alternative option. Your final sentence "it will benefit in a variety of ways" remains vague when you could specify exactly how these benefits outweigh those of a sports complex.

Exemplar: While a sports complex would provide recreational opportunities, the immediate need for community safety and crime prevention makes a police station the more essential investment for our area's wellbeing.

■ Your piece presents a clear position with organised reasons, which forms a solid foundation for persuasive writing. However, your argument needs more substance to convince readers. Many of your claims feel like opinions rather than proven facts because you haven't explained *why* or *how* your ideas would work in reality. Additionally, you focus entirely on the benefits of a police station without comparing it to the sports complex option, which weakens your persuasive power. To improve, develop each paragraph by adding one or two sentences that explain the reasoning behind your claims or provide realistic examples of how your solution would work. Also, consider adding a paragraph that acknowledges what a sports complex might offer before explaining why a police station addresses more urgent community needs.
